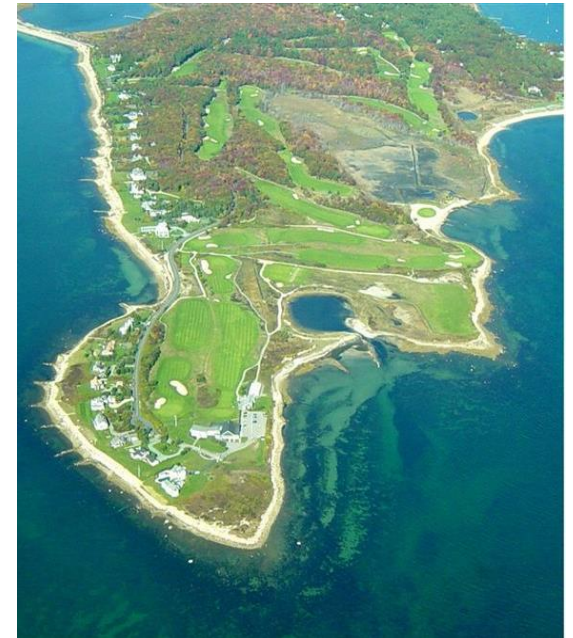

THE KITTANSETT CLUB A BRIEF HISTORY

The Beverly Yacht Club originally purchased a small piece of land on Butlers Point in 1913 to build a club house for their members to meet and socialize on race days. After World War I the Yacht Club fell into financial difficulties and the idea of building a golf course to share the point would appeal to local residence and help the financial situation. Galen Stone and Fredric Hood engineered the purchase of the land and by 1922 the plans were put in motion to design, fund, and build the golf course.

Golf Course Architect William Flynn routed and designed the layout and construction was supervised by Mr. Hood. The original soil test borings looked good but soon after construction began a huge problem arose. A tremendous amount of rock in the ground almost put a stop to the project. Additional funds were acquired and the course was completed in 1923. The name Kittansett was selected by the club and is derived from two Indian words meaning near the sea.

Since establishment The Kittansett Club has endured several devastating hurricanes and was shut down during World War II while the U.S. Coast Guard occupied Butlers Point to set up a gun battery to protect the harbor. Without the hard work and dedication of the Membership and Staff the course surely would have succumb to all the adversities.

The Club hosted the 1953 Walker Cup Matches and periodically host state and regional competitions. Kittansett is consistently ranked in the Top 100 Course in America.
